13	WHEREAS, The Alaska Department of Public Safety (DPS) issued a Public					
14	Notice on March 17, 2021, with proposed regulation changes to allow the use of all-					
15	terrain vehicles (ATVs) and snowmobiles on public roads; and					
16						
17	WHEREAS, The Fairbanks North Star Borough (FNSB) recognizes ATVs and					
18	snowmobiles fulfill the basic mobility needs of some Alaska residents, particularly in rural					
19	and remote locales, but believes the proposed changes will consequentially increase in					
20	the number of fatalities and serious injuries on roads Statewide; and					
21						
22	WHEREAS, The proposed changes are contrary to the recommendations of					
23	the Alaska Strategic Highway Safety Plan 2018-2022 (SHSP), which highlights strategies					
24	and actions to reduce the number of ATV and snowmobile fatal and serious injury crashes					
25	Statewide; and					
26						
27	WHEREAS, Development of the SHSP was led by the Alaska Department of					
28	Transportation & Public Facilities (DOT&PF) and a 55-member Steering Committee,					
29	including representatives of the Alaska DPS, and meant to affect and be relevant to all					
30	State agencies; and					
31						

32	WHEREAS, The most recent five-year averages of fatalities and serious
33	injuries involving ATVs and snowmobile exceed the goals of the SHSP and are trending
34	upward; and
35	
36	WHEREAS, The University of Alaska Fairbanks completed a study in 2019
37	titled "Safety Evaluation of Statewide Off-Highway Vehicle Use in Alaska" 1 with funding
38	from the Alaska DOT&PF and Pacific Northwest Transportation Consortium, and
39	significant findings from this study included:
40	
41	The Alaska Trauma Registry indicates that 25% of the 1,352 incidents involving
<del>1</del> 2	ATVs and 18% of the 936 incidents involving snowmobiles occurred on highways
43	and other public roads between 2009 and 2014;
14	
45	Alaska Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) records indicate that there was a total
<del>1</del> 6	of 317 off-highway vehicle incidents on roadways, 20% of which involved children
47	16 years of age or younger between 2012 to 2017;
48	
49	There were 120 reported on-road crashes involving off-highway vehicles in the
50	Alaska DMV crash database in 2016 and an average of 80 reported crashes per
51	year between 2000 and 2016, and Alaska has previously seen years where the
52	number of snowmobile fatalities on public roadways exceeded the number of
53	fatalities in conventional automobiles;
54	
55	Locations were identified where as many as 60 off-highway vehicles used or
56	crossed a highway in a single day; and

58	Of the 447 total observations, 53% were observed to be using the road unlawfully
59	of which only 30% were observed to be wearing helmets and 17% were carrying
60	passengers on vehicles that were not intended for passengers.

62	WHEREAS, Title 28 of Alaska Statutes requires all motor vehicles driving on
63	a highway or other public parking place be registered, but driver licenses are not required
64	for operators of ATVs and snowmobiles; and
65	
66	WHEREAS, The proposed changes do not address the requirements of the
67	National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and Alaska DMV for equipment, driver
68	training, licensing, and insurance to make ATVs and snowmobiles "street legal" and
69	operators eligible to use such vehicles on public roads; and
70	
71	WHEREAS, The same rules of the road must apply to all motor vehicles and
72	operators on public roads or it could result in sharp increases in ATV and snowmobile
73	fatal and serious injury crashes, especially with young drivers of ATVs and snowmobiles
74	that are currently allowed to operate these vehicles without driver training, a license, or
75	insurance; and
76	
77	WHEREAS, The proposed changes include a provision to allow municipalities
78	to prohibit snowmobiles or all-purpose vehicles from using roadways, but the FNSB is a
79	Second-class Borough and has limited road and police powers; therefore there will be
80	limited, if any, opportunity to implement this provision; and
81	
82	WHEREAS, Other Second-class Boroughs throughout the State will face the
83	same challenge and most of the State is unincorporated, making this provision useful to
84	only a few municipalities; and

86	WHEREAS, In addition to the FNSB's concerns regarding the safety of the
87	traveling public, the proposed changes may have significant cost implications to Fairbanks North Star Borough, Alaska RESOLUTION NO. 2021- Page 3 of 4
