RESOLUTION NO. 2021 – 13

A RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE PROPOSED CHANGES ON THE USE OF ALL-TERRAIN VEHICLES AND SNOWMOBILES ON PUBLIC ROADS IN THE REGULATIONS OF THE ALASKA DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

WHEREAS, The Alaska Department of Public Safety (DPS) issued a Public Notice on March 17, 2021, with proposed regulation changes to allow the use of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and snowmobiles on public roads; and

WHEREAS, The Fairbanks North Star Borough (FNSB) recognizes ATVs and snowmobiles fulfill the basic mobility needs of some Alaska residents, particularly in rural and remote locales, but believes the proposed changes will consequentially increase in the number of fatalities and serious injuries on roads Statewide; and

WHEREAS, The proposed changes are contrary to the recommendations of the Alaska Strategic Highway Safety Plan 2018-2022 (SHSP), which highlights strategies and actions to reduce the number of ATV and snowmobile fatal and serious injury crashes Statewide; and

WHEREAS, Development of the SHSP was led by the Alaska Department of Transportation & Public Facilities (DOT&PF) and a 55-member Steering Committee, including representatives of the Alaska DPS, and meant to affect and be relevant to all State agencies; and

32 WHEREAS, The most recent five-year averages of fatalities and serious
33 injuries involving ATVs and snowmobile exceed the goals of the SHSP and are trending
34 upward; and

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36 WHEREAS, The University of Alaska Fairbanks completed a study in 2019
37 titled "Safety Evaluation of Statewide Off-Highway Vehicle Use in Alaska"¹ with funding
38 from the Alaska DOT&PF and Pacific Northwest Transportation Consortium, and
39 significant findings from this study included:

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41 The Alaska Trauma Registry indicates that 25% of the 1,352 incidents involving
42 ATVs and 18% of the 936 incidents involving snowmobiles occurred on highways
43 and other public roads between 2009 and 2014;

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45 Alaska Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) records indicate that there was a total
46 of 317 off-highway vehicle incidents on roadways, 20% of which involved children
47 16 years of age or younger between 2012 to 2017;

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49 There were 120 reported on-road crashes involving off-highway vehicles in the
50 Alaska DMV crash database in 2016 and an average of 80 reported crashes per
51 year between 2000 and 2016, and Alaska has previously seen years where the
52 number of snowmobile fatalities on public roadways exceeded the number of
53 fatalities in conventional automobiles;

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55 Locations were identified where as many as 60 off-highway vehicles used or
56 crossed a highway in a single day; and

58 Of the 447 total observations, 53% were observed to be using the road unlawfully
59 of which only 30% were observed to be wearing helmets and 17% were carrying
60 passengers on vehicles that were not intended for passengers.

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62 WHEREAS, Title 28 of Alaska Statutes requires all motor vehicles driving on
63 a highway or other public parking place be registered, but driver licenses are not required
64 for operators of ATVs and snowmobiles; and

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66 WHEREAS, The proposed changes do not address the requirements of the
67 National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and Alaska DMV for equipment, driver
68 training, licensing, and insurance to make ATVs and snowmobiles "street legal" and
69 operators eligible to use such vehicles on public roads; and

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71 WHEREAS, The same rules of the road must apply to all motor vehicles and
72 operators on public roads or it could result in sharp increases in ATV and snowmobile
73 fatal and serious injury crashes, especially with young drivers of ATVs and snowmobiles
74 that are currently allowed to operate these vehicles without driver training, a license, or
75 insurance; and

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77 WHEREAS, The proposed changes include a provision to allow municipalities
78 to prohibit snowmobiles or all-purpose vehicles from using roadways, but the FNSB is a
79 Second-class Borough and has limited road and police powers; therefore there will be
80 limited, if any, opportunity to implement this provision; and

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82 WHEREAS, Other Second-class Boroughs throughout the State will face the
83 same challenge and most of the State is unincorporated, making this provision useful to
84 only a few municipalities; and

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86 WHEREAS, In addition to the FNSB's concerns regarding the safety of the
87 traveling public, the proposed changes may have significant cost implications to
Fairbanks North Star Borough, Alaska

88 manufacturers, private businesses, consumers, and the State, as well as jeopardize
89 Federal highway funding opportunities for communities Statewide.

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91 NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Assembly of the Fairbanks
92 North Star Borough encourages the Alaska Department of Public Safety to withdraw the
93 proposed regulation changes on the use of all-terrain vehicles and snowmobiles on public
94 roads until a working group of relevant and affected agencies and organizations has been
95 established to jointly author the changes in a comprehensive and equitable manner that
96 maintains the safety of the traveling public and considers the costs of such changes.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE FY 2020-21 BUDGET BY AUTHORIZING A 0.25 FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) EMPLOYEE POSITION FOR CROSS-TRAINING OF THE PERSONNEL/PAYROLL MANAGER POSITION

WHEREAS, The human resources Personnel/Payroll Manager has notified the Fairbanks North Star Borough (Borough) of her intent to retire on July 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, The Personnel/Payroll Manager position is a critical position that requires significant cross-training to ensure a smooth transition; and

WHEREAS, The Borough has found a Personnel/Payroll Manager replacement and offered the position to one of the Personnel/Payroll Technicians, with an effective date of March 22, 2021; and

WHEREAS, The human resources department needs to fill the vacant Personnel/Payroll Technician position as quickly as possible; and

WHEREAS, During the transition period, an additional 0.25 FTE is required for the last three months of FY 2020-21 to allow the new Personnel/Payroll Manager to cross-train with the outgoing manager; and

WHEREAS, The human resources department can cover the salary associated with the additional FTE through the end of FY 2020-21 with department salary savings from position vacancies; and

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WHEREAS, The FTE position count and funding for the last month of cross-training will be incorporated into the FY 2021-22 annual budget.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Assembly of the Fairbanks North Star Borough:

Section 1. Classification. This ordinance is not of a general and permanent nature and shall not be codified.

Section 2. Position Authorization. The FY 2020-21 budget is hereby amended by increasing the employee position count by 0.25 full-time equivalent in the human resources department.


Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance is effective at 5:00 p.m. on the first Borough business day following its adoption.

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



